requested direction from the Court when, in the opinion of ADWR, 1) the data received from the parties either does not reflect predevelopment conditions and/or 2) is not reasonably usable. ADWR also requests clarification on whether it needs to map a subflow zone in the area of Willow Creek and Willow Creek Reservoir. ADWR Request for Directions and Clarification on Mapping Reservoirs for the Subflow Delineation Report, July 10, 2024, p. 5.

Mapping a subflow zone in the area of Willow Creek and Willow Creek Reservoir.

ADWR should not map a subflow zone associated with Willow Creek and Willow Creek Reservoir. ADWR determined that Willow Creek was ephemeral under predevelopment conditions¹ and therefore there is nothing for ADWR to map in the area of the reservoir. Willow Creek Reservoir was referenced in the January 222, 2024, Order in error.

Data received from the parties does not reflect predevelopment conditions or is not reasonably usable

It cannot be overstated that subflow is a legal construct, and it is well-accepted within the General Stream Adjudication that there simply is not a single bright line that can be drawn to determine the boundaries of where groundwater pumping does or does not affect surface water. That said, all parties to the Adjudication are subject to the approximation of such a line, the subflow zone, as delineated by this Court. Arizona Revised Stutes §45-256(A) requires this Court to turn to ADWR for technical assistance with the subflow zone delineation. Not, however, the reverse.

Neither ADWR nor the Court are *required* to use data received from any source, including parties to the adjudication. ADWR is permitted to use whatever data is

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reasonable, as well as the professional judgement of agency staff, when making recommendations to the Court for subflow zone delineations. Where data is available, but in the professional opinion of ADWR, not appropriate, there is no requirement for its use. What is most important is a thorough review of all data available and a detailed explanation of why data is on is not applicable.

The use of predevelopment conditions is predicated on reasonably complete and reliable data. The Arizona Supreme Court established that "it is critical that any test used for determining the boundaries of a subflow zone be as accurate and reliable as possible." *In re General Adjudication of All Rights to Use Water in the Gila River System and Source*, 198 Ariz 330, at 335 (2000). Because wells within the subflow zone are presumed to be pumping appropriable water, an indefensible delineation would "improperly shift the burden to the groundwater user to show that its well is not pumping subflow." *Id.* Where the data ADWR received does not reflect predevelopment conditions or provide any relevant insight into predevelopment conditions, that data should not be used and ADWR should rely on appropriate surrogate information, such as geologic mapping, or mining and agricultural data, to the extent defensible. Thus, where there is insufficient information for ADWR to support a subflow zone delineation, ADWR should not recommend a delineation.

IT IS ORDERED that ADWR will not map a subflow zone associated with Willow Creek and Willow Creek Reservoir.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that ADWR will refer to the November 27, 2017, Order for Production of a Subflow Delineation Technical Report for the Verde River Watershed for subflow zone delineation guidance. If, after comprehensive research, ADWR finds there is no reliable data available regarding predevelopment conditions, and no reasonable extrapolations may be made from available surrogate information, no subflow zone delineation in the location shall be mapped.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that deadlines regarding all subflow delineation revisions will be provided by the Court at the conclusion of the evidentiary hearing scheduled for late August 2024 regarding the Verde subflow delineation in the areas of Big Chino Wash and Partridge Creek.
