



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
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HOW MARICOPA COUNTY'S JUVENILE JUSTICE SYSTEM WORKS




STATE AND COUNTY STATISTICS/JUVENILE POPULATION



- Arizona is geographically the 6th largest state in the nation with 113,642 square miles and a population of 6,305,210 in 15 counties.
- Maricopa County is the 4th most populated county in the nation with 9,204 square miles, and a population of 3,792,675 (DES estimate, July 2006).
- Approximately 61% of the state's population resides in Maricopa County.
- There are 412 residents per square mile.
- Phoenix (population 1,505,265) is the county seat, state capital, and the largest city in the state.
- Other major cities in Maricopa County are: Mesa (451,360); Glendale (243,540); Scottsdale (237,120); Chandler (235,450); Gilbert (185,030); Tempe (165,890); and Peoria (145,125).




COMPLAINTS/JUVENILES



In 2006, there were an estimated 502,038 juveniles between the ages of 8 and 17 living in Maricopa County. In any given year, about 5% of the juvenile population between the ages of 8 and 17 of Maricopa County are referred at least once to the Juvenile Court. That's about one juvenile in every 20. In 2006, there were 33,658 referrals generated by 24,691 juveniles, which computes to 1.36 referrals per juvenile. Since 2002, the number of complaints has dropped by 3.4%. However, the average number of complaints per juvenile (1.36) has not dropped since 2002.

TYPE OF COMPLAINT



There are four types of complaints:

- Citation: Juvenile is issued a citation (i.e. traffic ticket).
- Detained: Juvenile is detained at detention center.
- Not Detained: Juvenile is brought to detention center, screened and released for follow-up.
- Paper: Referral is sent to the Juvenile Court and the County Attorney for processing.


The top ten offenses have not changed significantly over the past five years, although the rank order has changed. In 2005, shoplifting replaced truancy as the most common offense. This was due, in part, to increased enforcement by local businesses. This year truancy has returned to the number one spot. This is partly due to a reduction of officers in the CUTS program and partly due to increased enforcement by some schools issuing more citations. It is expected that truancy will continue to fall within the top ten referrals as research has shown that truancy is a significant pre-cursor to more serious delinquent behavior. Similarly, curfew moved up to second place since last year because of procedural changes within local law enforcement.

COMPLAINTS RECEIVED 2006 SEVERITY TYPE OF OFFENSE



There are literally hundreds of different types of offenses that are sent to the Juvenile Court each year. To analyze these offenses more efficiently each offense has been placed into one of nine severity types. Here are the nine types in descending order of severity:

Violent

These are felony offenses against persons such as murder, aggravated assault, or robbery.

Felony Property

These are felony offenses in which property is damaged or stolen, and the property is worth more than \$250. Examples are burglary, theft, forgery, criminal damage, or graffiti.

Obstruction

These offenses are illegal acts that impede the enforcement of justice. For juveniles, 75% of these offenses are a violation of the terms of probation.

Fighting

These are misdemeanor offenses against persons, such as simple assault.

Drugs

These are offenses that involve the use or sale of any drug, and are almost always felonies. Paint and glue sniffing are included here.

Public Peace *

These offenses are generally misdemeanors, and involve acts like disorderly conduct, giving false information, trespass, weapons misconduct, and possession of alcohol.

Misdemeanor Property

These are property offenses in which the property is valued less than \$250. The most common offenses are shoplifting and criminal damage.

Status *

These offenses are acts that are illegal only because a juvenile commits them, such as: incorrigibility, truancy, runaway, and curfew.







Administrative

These are not illegal offenses, but are creations of the court which help record the court's involvement with a juvenile in certain situations, such as holding a juvenile for another jurisdiction or agency, or conducting a hearing on a matter transferred from another jurisdiction.



COMPLAINTS RECEIVED 2002 – 2006

The graphs on this and the next page show the trends among offenses in the past five years. Violent, Obstruction, Fighting, and Misdemeanor Property decreased, while Felony Property, Drug, Public Peace and Status complaints increased from last year.


MOST FREQUENT COMPLAINT SOURCES – ANNUAL CHANGES

The total number of complaints has declined 3.6% over the last 5 years. The source of complaints has changed as well. Complaints from the Phoenix Police Department have dropped 2.9% from 2002 to 2006 (although the proportion of overall complaints has remained constant compared to 2001). The numbers of complaints from Schools, Glendale, Chandler, the Maricopa County Sheriff, and Gilbert have increased.


CHARACTERISTICS OF JUVENILES REFERRED GENDER





CHARACTERISTICS OF JUVENILES REFERRED ETHNICITY

The data on this page shows the ethnic breakdown of complaints received in 2006 and compares it with the ethnic distribution of juveniles ages 8 through 17 in Maricopa County. The bar graph shows that Anglo (Caucasian, but not Hispanic) juveniles account for 56.2% of the population but only 43.7% of the complaints. Hispanic juveniles show just the reverse, 33% of the population but 41.3% of the complaints. African Americans have a much higher share of the complaints than their share of the population (10.5% of the complaints compared to only 4.5% of the population). Asians produce the fewest complaints in comparison to their share of the population. This distribution of complaints across ethnic groups has remained relatively constant in recent years. The category of other includes those with ethnicity listed as unknown.



Ethnic Breakdown of Complaints and Juvenile Population






DETENTION

JUVENILES BROUGHT TO DETENTION SCREENING AND JUVENILES DETAINED

In 2006, there were 10,269 juveniles brought to detention, which resulted in 8,558 (83.3%) admissions. Requests generally occur when a police officer believes that a juvenile, apparently involved in illegal activity, needs to be confined to protect the community or the juvenile himself.

A juvenile probation officer, assigned to the Detention Screening Unit decides whether to detain or release the juvenile based on Supreme Court Rules and Juvenile Probation Department administrative criteria. Detention screeners are on duty 24 hours a day, every day of the year, at both detention facilities.



Of the 8,558 admissions 2,810 were for delinquent or incorrigible acts. The remaining 5,748 were detained on warrants, court holds, or holds for other jurisdictions or agencies, or as a term of probation.

The average daily population in detention for 2006 was 423 an 5.6% increase since 2002.




The average length of stay in 2006 was 18.2 days, about four days longer than in 2002. Approximately 46.4% of juveniles are released from detention in two days or less; either charges could not be filed against them, or a judge released them upon reviewing their situation more thoroughly.

Detention is regularly over capacity. In 2002, the average daily population was 12.4% over capacity, in 2006 that decreased to 4.6%.

The number of juveniles on Probation has been decreasing in recent years. Since 2002, the number on standard probation has dropped by 7.9%, and the number on JIPS by 20%.







Number of Felony Adjudications





ACCOUNTABILITY


When juveniles are referred for violations of the law, the Juvenile Court is required to hold them accountable for their actions. Some options available are requiring them to pay restitution to a victim, perform community service work, pay a fine or attend an education program that addresses a particular problem.

Many juveniles who are required to perform unpaid community service work do it through the Juvenile Community Offender Restitution and Public Service program (JCORPS). The juveniles in this program: clean-up graffiti, pick up roadside litter, help to build and refurbish homes, and work in food banks. Probation staff members who are assigned to JCORPS locate sites for juveniles to do community work, bring them to the sites, and supervise them while they work.


If juveniles do not comply with the sanctions imposed, they are subject to further action, such as a violation of probation, or filing of a petition which could result in being placed on probation.

The charts on this and the next page show how juveniles have been held accountable, and how they have complied with orders to pay penalties or restitution, work in the community, attend educational programs, or complete other consequences.

COURT ORDERED MONETARY PENALTY 2002 – 2006




RESTITUTION 2002 - 2006






ACCOUNTABILITY WORK HOURS 2002-2006



EDUCATIONAL / COUNSELING PROGRAMS 2002 - 2006





TRENDS: COMMITMENTS TO JUVENILE CORRECTIONS



Juveniles, who are committed to the Department of Juvenile Corrections (ADJC) or prosecuted as adults, present the most serious challenges to the juvenile justice system. These are juveniles whom judges and probation officers consider the highest risk to the community. When a juvenile is committed or prosecuted as an adult, the Juvenile Court relinquishes supervision of that juvenile. The tables on the following pages show how many of these cases there have been over the past 5 years.

Initial commitments to Juvenile Corrections increased from 2002 to 2005 and then dropped slightly in 2006. Awards are cases in which a juvenile previously committed is adjudicated for a new offense and returned to ADJC. The number of awards to ADJC increased by 6% from 2002 to 2006.




COMMITMENT PROFILE 2006

In 2006, the number of juveniles committed to the Arizona Department of Juvenile Corrections (ADJC) was 422. Similar to 2005, the majority (82%) of the juveniles had only one prior felony adjudication, and nearly half (46%) were committed on a probation violation.



JUVENILES PROSECUTED AS ADULTS

Not all juveniles accused of illegal acts are prosecuted in Juvenile Court. Arizona law requires that under certain conditions (based on the offense alleged and the juvenile's age and offense history) the county attorney must file charges against the juvenile in adult criminal court. These are referred to as **Direct Files** and came into law in July 1997. In certain other situations the state may file adult charges.

If the juvenile and/or his offense history do not meet the requirements for a Direct File, the state may file a Petition for Transfer, in which the state is asking the Juvenile Court to **remand** the juvenile to criminal court for prosecution as an adult.

The number of juveniles transferred to adult has changed as a result of the 1997 legislation. This legislation led to an all-time high of 616 adult prosecutions in 1998 (81 remands and 535 direct files). Since then, the number of adult prosecutions has fluctuated; in 2006 there was a 22% increase from the 2002 level.




JUVENILES PROSECUTED AS ADULTS DIRECT FILES



DIVERSION

Most illegal activity by juveniles involves children who are first or second time offenders charged with relatively minor illegal acts. There is a good chance they will never be referred again. For the most part, these are the types of juveniles assigned to diversion programs. The Early Intervention Division is dedicated to the principles of Restorative Justice and encourages participation from the victim, the offender, and the community. In a diversion program a juvenile can satisfy his obligation to the state and to the victim without going through the formal court process. To satisfy his obligation a juvenile must:

- Acknowledge responsibility for the illegal act and
- Participate in unpaid community service work and/or an approved counseling, education, rehabilitation, or supervision program;
- Pay restitution to the victim when requested; or
- Pay a monetary assessment when required.

If the juvenile complies with the requirements, the County Attorney will not file formal charges. If the juvenile does not comply, the case is submitted to the County Attorney for review. This could result in the filing of a petition alleging delinquency or incorrigibility.

The juvenile probation department, several cities, schools and private enterprises administer an array of diversion programs. The County Attorney's office determines which offenses are eligible for diversion. These are generally misdemeanor offenses, status offenses and a limited number of drug/alcohol related offenses.

Juveniles are assigned to any one of several types of diversion programs, depending on where they live and the type of offense alleged. In order to participate in diversion, the juvenile must accept responsibility for the alleged delinquent or incorrigible behavior. In order to have the matter closed without formal Court action, the juvenile must complete all sanctions imposed by the Juvenile Probation Officer.

The following are some of the diversion programs we have available:

Diversion Program: The majority of delinquent and status offense referrals are assigned to Probation Officers within the Diversion Unit of the Early Intervention Program. These Officers schedule interviews with the juvenile and family in order to determine if the case can be handled without formal Court involvement. In order to determine if the juvenile will enter a diversion program, the Juvenile Probation Officer considers the nature of the offense along with other social, educational and familial information.

Community Justice Panels: A number of delinquent and status offense referrals are assigned to Community Justice Panels. A Community Justice Panel is made up of a Probation Officer and volunteers from the local community. The panels meet with juveniles and their parents/guardians within local communities and conduct interviews similar to those held within Diversion. This restorative justice effort allows for the community and the offender to participate in the resolution of the complaint. The department has partnered with neighborhood associations, community groups, and local retailers to form the Community Justice Panels. In order to participate in diversion, the juvenile must accept responsibility for the alleged delinquent or incorrigible behavior. In order to have the matter closed without formal Court action, the juvenile must complete all sanctions imposed by the Juvenile Probation Officer.

Domestic Violence Program: Referrals alleging domestic violence are assigned to a Probation Officer that has received specialized training related to domestic violence issues. These Officers have a variety of services and programs specific to Domestic Violence available to them.

City Diversion Programs: Several cities in Maricopa County operate or fund city specific diversion programs. Generally these programs provide diversion for juveniles that have received their first referral for things such as truancy, status offenses, or liquor offenses. The cities of Phoenix, Mesa, Gilbert, Scottsdale, Peoria, and Glendale

have diversion programs. If juveniles do not complete the consequences or programs assigned through the city diversion process, the case is then assigned to the Diversion unit for follow up. Depending upon the circumstances, the juveniles can be offered another diversion program, or the case may be sent to the County Attorney for review.

Drug Diversion: First time offenders referred for drug related offenses can be assigned to the Drug Diversion program, as determined by the County Attorney's Office. The County Attorney may find that the case is appropriate for Drug Diversion and then make them eligible to participate in a drug education and prevention program. If the juvenile completes the approved drug education and prevention program, the County Attorney will not file a petition.

Teen Court: Teen Court is an alternative sentencing option whereby consequences related to delinquent or status offenses are imposed by a jury of their peers. Before being assigned to Teen Court, the juveniles meet with a Probation Officer, accept responsibility for their actions, and agree to have their case heard within one of the Teen Courts operated across Maricopa County. The jury is trained and supervised by probation staff, or other adult volunteers familiar with the juvenile justice system. Both the juvenile and parents must appear before the Teen Court.

CUTS: The Court Unified Truancy Suppression program is a cooperative effort between the Juvenile Probation Department and several schools to work with truant students and their families. The Probation Officer meets the juvenile and family on campus and works directly with school personnel to develop consequences that are completed at the school and assist the family in maintaining good attendance.

DIVERSION CONSEQUENCES

The following table shows the many different kinds of consequences given to juveniles in Diversion.

There is not a one-to-one relationship among juveniles, complaints, and diversion consequences. A juvenile can be given more than one consequence for a single complaint, and occasionally two complaints can be dealt with simultaneously and receive the same consequence(s).

In 2006 a total of 10,358 juveniles were given 18,500 consequences for 10,653 diversion-eligible complaints and citations.

TREATMENT

Each year juvenile probation officers refer thousands of juveniles to various programs in the community. The programs vary from individual or group counseling sessions to specialized residential treatment centers. The Probation Department tracks those services paid for out of the funding allocated by the Administrative Office of the Courts (AOC) and the County. The table below shows the number of delinquent and incorrigible juveniles referred to various treatment programs in 2006. It is possible for a juvenile to become involved in more than one program, or be involved in the same program more than one time. The table counts juveniles only one time if they are involved in a program more than once, but if they are involved with more than one program, they are counted in each program.


PROBABILITY OF NOT GETTING A NEW OFFENSE WITHIN ONE YEAR

Recidivism is the variable most commonly used to judge how a juvenile has responded to intervention by the juvenile justice system. This section examines a juvenile's performance for one year from the time they complete involvement with the Probation Department. All the tables on this and the following two pages show the likelihood that a juvenile will not be apprehended for an illegal act within that year.

Juveniles who are 17 years old at the time of completion are not included, because they will not have an entire year available. Violations of probation are not counted as recidivism.

The first table looks at all offenses received in a year and shows the percentage of juveniles who have remained referral-free for 365 days. "First Timers" includes only juveniles who generated their first referral in that year. "All Juveniles" includes the first referral in that year of any juvenile regardless of referral history. First Timers always have a better chance of success, simply because most juveniles who are apprehended learn from their experience and are never referred again.

Note: This shows juveniles tracked for 365 days after a referral to see if he (she) recidivates or if the 365 days pass without another complaint.


Juveniles who are 17 years old at the time of their complaint are excluded since they would not have 365 days left under the jurisdiction of the juvenile court.

Also excluded are all administrative offenses, violations of probation and invalid complaints.

RECIDIVISM DIVERSION


By law juveniles who are apprehended for illegal activity must complete some consequence, which could be in a Diversion Program, or through placement on Probation. The following two tables show the probability of **not being apprehended for a new offense** for all the juveniles who **successfully** completed either Diversion or Probation in a given year. The time starts when the juvenile completes the program and runs for 365 days. Again, juveniles who are 17 years old at time of completion are not included.

Successful Completion of Diversion**





RECIDIVISM PROBATION

Successful Release from Probation**




CLASS OF 2006


VICTIMS AND RESTITUTION

Restitution is the act of returning or restoring to a victim (either a person or a legal entity) what is theirs. The Court can order full or partial restitution to a victim after the juvenile has been adjudicated delinquent (found guilty).


After the juvenile's first court hearing the Victim Services Unit at the Juvenile Probation Department sends a letter to the victim(s) of the crime. Victim Services keeps the victim(s) informed of all developments in the case, and informs them about how to request restitution. Victims must submit a verified Victim Statement to the Court to receive restitution.

The charts below show the number of victims that have been contacted each year by the Victim Services Unit, the number juveniles who have paid restitution, and the amount paid.


Number of Victims Contacted

Amount of Restitution Paid




COURT ACTIVITY 2006 PETITIONS FILED

Juvenile judges and commissioners make decisions about adoption and dependency matters as well as delinquency and incorrigibility. The data on the next three pages show the various petitions and hearings which occupy the Juvenile Court Calendar.

The significant changes in delinquency petitions over the past few years are a result of procedural changes in the processing of citations. In 1999 they were heard as delinquency matters by juvenile court judges and commissioners, rather than juvenile hearing officers throughout the county. In 2001, as more cases were being cited directly to the juvenile court center they were being diverted to probation officers. This area will continue to change as the process is improved to handle the increasing number of citations sent directly to the juvenile court.

In 1999, a procedural change allowed severances to be filed through motions on an existing dependency petition. In 2006, these motions were counted, resulting in the dramatic increase (583%) in the severance filings seen here from 2002.











A hearing is considered "Held" if it has a recorded start and end time. A Completed hearing is one showing a result of completed or under advisement; in other words, it is not continued to another date.

In 2006, a total of 95,668 hearings were scheduled, a total of 68,469 hearings were held, and 59,900 were completed.

Over half (56%) of the total hearings scheduled were for delinquency matters which is a slight decrease from 2004 and equal to 2005.

TOP 20 ZIP CODES

This table focuses on the 20 ZIP codes in Maricopa County that generated the most complaints in 2006. Note that it portrays where the juvenile lived at the time of the offense, not where the offense took place. The ZIP codes are ranked one through twenty and compared to their ranking and number of complaints five years earlier in 2002.

The last column shows the percentage changes from 2006 to 2002. The rate at which complaints rose or fell during the five years. Areas that have increased show a positive percentage and they are in Avondale, Central Phoenix, and Phoenix. Overall complaints from these 20 ZIP codes have decreased by 10.1% since 2002.



