ORDER REGARDING ADWR'S REQUEST TO MODIFY SCHEDULE FOR ISSUANCE OF REPORTS

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CONTESTED CASE NAME: In re Subflow Technical Report, Verde River Watershed

**DESCRIPTIVE SUMMARY**: New schedule set to complete preliminary and final HSRs for the Sycamore, Lower Verde Valley, the Little Chino and the Big Chino Subwatersheds.

Arizona Department of Water Resources ("ADWR") filed a Request to Modify Schedule for Issuance of Reports to extend the deadlines for filing Preliminary and Final Hydrographic Survey Reports ("HSRs") for the Sycamore Subwatershed and the Lower Verde Valley Subwatershed. It stated that the extension is necessary to incorporate the results of a determination about *de minimis* uses in the Verde River Watershed and the adoption of summary procedures.

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The evidentiary hearing is scheduled for July 10, 2024 and the due dates for the Preliminary HSRs for the two subwatersheds are January 5, 2024, and June 6, 2025, respectively.

A de minimis determination is essentially a case management decision made by a court that the benefits of resolving objections to certain types of claims for water rights are substantially outweighed by the costs that would otherwise be incurred by the parties and the court. The determination affects the adjudication of the claimed water rights because it provides the basis for the adoption of summary procedures to expedite the adjudication of water rights. A determination that a particular type of use is de minimis does not impact the obligations or the responsibilities of Arizona Department of Water Resources to fully investigate claims and prepare HSRs pursuant to The validity of the summary proceedings is fundamentally rooted in the A.R.S. §45-256. expectation that ADWR will fully apply its technical expertise to the examination of the Statements of Claimant filed, the water rights claimed, and its physical investigation of the water uses that are the subject of the claimed water rights. Thus, a finding that certain water uses are de minimis and the adoption of summary proceedings should not impact ADWR's analysis of claimed water rights, the number of attributes investigated, the preparation of the individual watershed file reports incorporated in the HSRs, or any other technical work that ADWR must complete to prepare the HSRs. Similarly, the adoption of de minimis proceedings have no impact on the obligations of claimants establishing and asserting water rights before the adjudication process is undertaken by the courts.

Arizona Department of Water Resources states that the HSRs will provide ADWR with an opportunity to provide each claimant with all of the information that pertains to the relevant water claims. The watershed file reports prepared by ADWR in the San Pedro River Watershed and the Silver Creek Watershed provided comprehensive information about claims for water rights and the results of ADWR's investigations. In the case of the Verde River Watershed, ADWR proposes to take an additional step to aid in expediting the adjudications. Specifically, it will prepare draft abstracts for at least those proposed water rights that qualify as *de minimis* uses in addition to the watershed file reports. The results of the *de minimis* proceedings must be incorporated into those

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draft abstracts for water rights that qualify as *de minimis* uses. The draft abstracts will also be accompanied by maps of the places of use and points of diversion. Arizona Department of Water Resources is undertaking this additional work to give claimants a better understanding of the attributes of the proposed water rights. Given the unquestionable merit of this proposal and its potential benefit to claimants, a reasonable delay in the issuance of the HSRs to allow the incorporation of the results of the *de minimis* decision in draft abstracts for proposed water rights is justified.

Under the current schedule, ADWR would issue its first preliminary HSR for a subwatershed in the Verde River Watershed in less than a year with preliminary HSRs for two additional subwatersheds due in 18-month intervals. Specifically, the Preliminary HSRs for the Sycamore Subwatershed, the Lower Verde Valley Subwatershed, and the Little Chino Subwatershed are due on January 5, 2024, June 6, 2025, and January 5, 2026, respectively. The final HSR for each subwatershed is due approximately one year after the issuance of the Preliminary HSR. The schedule submitted by ADWR would delay the deadline for the Preliminary HSR for the Sycamore Subwatershed for five years and postpone the deadline for the Preliminary HSR for the Lower Verde Valley for a year until June 2026. It proposes no change for the Little Chino Subwatershed and adds dates for the Big Chino Preliminary and Final HSR, which have not yet been set. Thus, the inclusion of draft abstracts for proposed water rights based on decisions issued in connection with the *de minimis* proceedings under the ADWR proposed schedule will delay the issuance of the first preliminary HSR in the Verde River Watershed by at least two and one-half years.

The *de minimis* decision should not affect any aspect of the preparation of the HSRs and therefore should not cause any delay in ADWR's current plans to prepare the HSRs. It also should not affect the preparation of the maps of the *de minimis* uses that will be attached to the draft abstracts. Arizona Department of Water Resources' mapping capabilities have significantly improved since the 1990s and it requires much less time to identify the precise locations of uses. Accordingly, ADWR should focus its efforts on creating maps that locate the places of use and

points of diversion as specifically as possible. The issue presented here is the amount of time that ADWR will require to prepare the draft abstracts after the issuance of the final *de minimis* decision. Assuming that the decision is issued in March 2025, 12 months should be sufficient time for ADWR to identify the attributes governed by the *de minimis* decision and complete the draft abstracts for the potential water rights consistent with the decision.

In its reply, ADWR raised the possibility that proceedings or additional proceedings in the adjudication court may prolong the anticipated process to issue a decision. If the *de minimis* decision cannot be finalized by early 2025, the timeline for the issuance of the HRSs should not be further extended. Similarly, if ADWR determines it cannot generate the draft abstracts from its watershed file reports by the due dates set forth below, the timeline for the issuance of the HSRs should not be extended. Instead, ADWR should issue the HSRs on the dates set below without the draft abstracts of the potential water rights. Claims for water uses that may qualify as *de minimis* should not be permitted to further delay the adjudication of other claims for water rights in the subwatersheds. The legislature determined with its revisions to A.R.S. §45-257 in 2017 that larger claims are to be adjudicated prior to the adjudication of most of the small water claims. While ADWR's current plan to distribute draft abstracts with individual watershed file reports would benefit claimants, the adjudication of *de minimis* water rights can proceed with the preparation of the draft abstracts after a contested case is initiated as is currently done in the San Pedro Watershed.

Arizona Department of Water Resources also proposed changing the order of the watersheds for which HSRs will be prepared and adding dates for the preparation of the Big Chino Subwatershed. The order of the HSRs will not be changed. The dates proposed by ADWR for the preparation of the Big Chino Subwatershed will be adopted and it will be issued simultaneously with the preliminary and final HSRs for the Little Chino Subwatershed.
